The Legislature adjourned on August 31, 2018. The Governor will have until September 30, 2018 to sign or veto measures that reached his desk. 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SECTION 1: SALES AND USE TAXES/ DISTRICT TAXES

AB-709 / McCarty - Sacramento Regional Transit

District: Makes changes applicable to the Sacramento Regional Transit (SacRT) Act, including clarifying SacRT 's geographic area, and adding a one-eighth of one percent sales tax-rate increment to SacRT 's taxation authority. Similar authority was given to the Peninsula Corridor Joint Powers Board in SB 797 from 2017.

Status: [Governor's Desk](#). *Revenue enhancement tool; local authority.*

AB 2920/ Thurmond - North Lake Tahoe

Transportation Authority, and City of Berkeley:

Transactions and Use Tax: Exclusion from the 2% Cap: Would authorize these jurisdictions to impose a tax for voter approval for general or specific purposes at a rate of no more than 0.5% that would exceed the combined rate limit of 2%. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Revenue enhancement tool; local authority.*

SB 152/ McGuire - County of Sonoma, a City Within Sonoma, Sonoma County Transportation Authority:

Transactions and Use Tax: Exclusion from the 2% Cap: Would authorize any of these agencies to impose a transaction and use tax for general purposes, at a rate of no more than 1% that, in combination with other transactions and use taxes, would exceed the combined rate limit of 2%. Repeals this authorization on January 1, 2026, if an ordinance proposing the tax has not been approved by that date. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Revenue enhancement tool; local authority.*

SB 1007/ Hertzberg - State and Local Sales and Use Tax Exemption: Military and Veterans Medical Facilities:

Exempts after January 1, 2019 and before January 1, 2025 "building materials and supplies" purchased for use in the construction of a "qualified facility." May result in a revenue loss in the range of \$100,000 as a result of the exemption being used on a facility. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Potential local revenue loss.*

SB 1484/ E. Hernandez - State and Local Sales and Use Tax Exemption: Charitable Thrift:

Extends the January 1, 2019 sunset to January 1, 2029. Applies if the purpose of the thrift store is to obtain funding for services provided to individuals with HIV or AIDS. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Potential local revenue loss.*

SCA 20/ Glazer - Changes Local Sales Tax Revenue from On-Line Transactions: Point of Sale to Point of Delivery:

MuniServices representatives are participating in the League of California Cities Working Group meetings that includes discussing SCA 20, and alternatives and options for tax reform. SCA 20 proposed to shift the allocation of sales and use tax for all online purchases from point-of-sale (POS) to point-of-destination. Refer to the following for further detail: <https://www.avenuinsights.com/2018/08/30/league-of-california-cities-city-managers-working-group/> **Status:** Held in Senate Appropriations. *Would have created revenue 'winners and losers.'*

SECTION 2: PROPERTY AND PARCEL TAXES

AB 2954/ Bonta and AB 2458 - Local Parcel Taxes:

School Districts: AB 2954 allows parcel taxes to apply uniformly to unimproved properties taxed at a lower rate. AB 2458 requires county tax collectors to post online information received from school districts about available parcel tax exemptions for senior and disabled taxpayers and to include a message about the online information with the annual property tax bill. These bills are double-joined. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Conforms school districts with other local agencies with respect to parcel taxes.*

AB 2663/ Friedman - Change-in-Ownership Exclusion for Domestic Partners:

Creates an exclusion from property reassessment for transfers of property between same-sex local registered domestic partners from January 1, 2000, to June 26, 2015. Prior to 2006, a change in ownership between domestic partners was not eligible for the same exclusion that applied to married couples. Legislation fixed the discrepancy, but domestic partners registered only with a county, city or other local jurisdiction were ineligible for the exclusion. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Property tax reduction.*

SB 958/ Dodd - Exemption from School Parcel Taxes:

Davis School District: Allows district voters to decide on a parcel tax exemption for public school employees of the school district - for their principal place of residence located within the boundaries of the school district. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Allows for an exemption from school parcel taxes; jurisdiction specific.*



SB 1115 / Hill - Property Tax Exemption: Low Income Housing: Increases from \$10 million to \$20 million the cap on valuation for non-publicly financed housing owned and operated by a non-profit organization for purposes of the welfare exemption from property tax. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Property tax reduction.*

SECTION 3: BUSINESS LICENSE

AB 767/ Quirk-Silva - Renaming CalGold: California Business License Center: Would recast provisions related to CalGold (The Gold Standard For Permit Assistance). Renames CalGold, the "California Business License Center." The intent of CalGold is to assist users in finding the appropriate permit information for a business and also provides contact information for the various state and local agencies. An earlier version of the bill would have re-named CalGold to "Master Business License Center." MuniServices requested that the author substitute "Master," with "California" or "State," to mitigate possible confusion with respect to local licensing requirements. The bill's final analysis states that existing law and CalGold is specific to "state" law or regulation requirements.
<http://www.calgold.ca.gov/> **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *May create confusion for applicant requirements seeking a local business license.*

AB 2184/ Chiu - Business Licenses: Identification Requirements for Locals: Requires a locality that licenses businesses to accept a California driver's license or identification number, individual taxpayer identification number, or municipal identification number in lieu of a social security number if the locality requires a social security number for the issuance of a business license. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Creates implementation requirements; changes to local application forms.*

SB 855/ State Budget - City Business Tax Data Exchange Program: Removes the repeal date of January 1, 2019 for a tax data exchange agreement between the Franchise Tax Board and local governments. As of July 2017, 74 cities and counties are participating.

SECTION 4: LOCAL GOVERNANCE / ADDITIONAL ISSUES

AB 626/ Garcia - Microenterprise Home Kitchen (MHK) Operations: Establishes microenterprise home kitchens as a new category of retail food facility. Cities or counties would have discretion to authorize and permit MHK's to be operated by a resident in a private home. The bill requires a permit issued by a county that has authorized the permitting of MHK operations to be valid in any city within the county regardless of whether the city has separately enacted an ordinance or resolution to authorize or prohibit the permitting of MHKs within that city. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Creates implementation requirements.*

AB 939/ Low - Taxicab Regulation: Makes changes to AB 1069 (2017) that allowed for taxicab operators to obtain one to two permits in each county, instead of permits in every city and county in which the taxi operates and allowed for fewer permit fees and business licenses. Among other provisions, under AB 939, taxicab companies would only have to furnish self-collected information upon request, which would result in local agencies having to "chase down" which companies are doing business in their jurisdiction. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Creates implementation requirements.*

AB 1184/ Ting - City and County of San Francisco: Local Tax: Transportation Network Companies: Authorizes the City and County of San Francisco with local voter approval to impose a tax on each transportation network company (TNC) ride originating in the City and County. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Taxing ride-sharing trips; jurisdiction-specific impact.*

AB 2544/ Lackey - Parking Penalties: Requires processing agencies, for unpaid penalties that were issued before July 1, 2018, to provide a payment plan and waiver of late fees to indigent persons before they are able to send an itemization of unpaid parking penalties to the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). Public agencies are still in the process of implementing AB 503 (2017), which created a process for individuals to repay their unpaid parking penalties while being able to register and operate their vehicles. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Creates implementation requirements; changes to local processes; revenue impact.*



AB 2600/ Flora - Regional Park and Open Space Districts/ Financing: Establishes an alternative procedure for forming a regional park and open space district. Allows the county or city that contains the territory proposed to be included to form a district by adopting a resolution of application. **Status: Signed by the Governor.** *Local procedure for establishing regional parks or open space districts.*

AB 3168/ Rubio - Outdoor Advertising Displays: Designed to give cities flexibility to relocate permitted signage outside of municipal boundaries on to sections of landscaped freeway, while not adding any more new signage on California highways. **Status: Governor's Desk.** *Will create implementation requirements.*

AB 2363/ Friedman - Vision Zero Task Force: Requires the Secretary of Transportation, by July 1, 2019, to convene the Vision Zero Task Force to evaluate whether an alternative to the current process for setting speed limits should be considered and make recommendations on steps to increase pedestrian and bicyclist safety. This task force will incorporate members from local government. On a related note, AB 2955 / Friedman also on the Governor's Desk would extend to the cities of Burbank and Glendale the ability to have their traffic surveyors consider equestrian safety when setting speed limits in the area of the Rancho Master Plan. **Status: Governor's Desk.** *Implementation and stakeholder opportunity.*

AB 2598/ Quirk - Ordinances: Violation Increase: Would among other provisions increase the amount for a first violation to \$130, \$700 for a 2nd violation of the same ordinance within one year, and \$1,300 for each additional violation of the same ordinance within one year of the first violation. The bill would also provide for a fine of \$2,500 for each additional violation of the same ordinance within 2 years of the first violation if the property is a commercial property that has an existing building at the time of the violation and the violation is of a local building and safety code that is an infraction and is due to failure by the owner to remove visible refuse or failure to prohibit unauthorized use of the property. **Status: Governor's Desk.** *Creates implementation requirements; revenue increase.*

AB 2838/ Low - Ordinances Review: Gambling: Requires the Department of Justice to review and comment on any submitted ordinance within 60 days of receiving the ordinance under the Bureau of Gambling Control Act. The Bureau has often taken more than a year to respond to local governments regarding review of their proposed ordinance amendments. **Status: Governor's Desk.** *Enhances process for the DOJ approval of local gambling ordinances; economic development.*

SB 905/ Wiener - Pilot for Longer Alcohol Sales: Authorizes hours to 4 am in Cathedral City, Coachella, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Oakland, Palm Springs, Sacramento, San Francisco, and West Hollywood. Beginning January 1, 2021, and before January 2, 2026, would require the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control to conduct a pilot program that would authorize the department to issue an additional hours license to an on-sale licensee located in a qualified city (above) which would authorize, with or without conditions, the selling, giving, or purchasing of alcoholic beverages at the licensed premises between the hours of 2 a.m. and 4 a.m., upon completion of specified requirements by the qualified city in which the licensee is located. Would impose specified fees related to the license to be deposited in the Alcohol Beverage Control Fund. **Status: Governor's Desk.** *Creates implementation requirements; revenue increase, economic development; jurisdiction-specific.*

SB 244/ Lara - Consumer Privacy: Personal Information: Limits the collection and disclosure of information obtained by a local or state agency for purposes of issuing a local identification card, driver's license, or the administration of public services, as specified. Recognizing that information about residents may need to be shared for a variety of reasons, the bill would authorize the disclosure of information in certain circumstances. See: http://leginfo.legislature.ca.gov/faces/billAnalysisClient.xhtml?bill_id=201720180SB244 **Status: Governor's Desk.** *Creates implementation requirements.*



SB 872/ Budget - Local Government: Taxation: Prohibition: Groceries: Sweetened Beverages: Would until January 1, 2031, prohibit any local tax, fee, or other assessment on groceries. Would allow a local agency to continue to levy and collect, enforce, or reauthorize any tax, fee, or other assessment on groceries imposed, extended, or increased on or before January 1, 2018. Would make inoperative on the effective date of this measure any tax, fee, or other assessment on groceries imposed by a local agency after January 1, 2018. Would also ban cities and counties from creating taxes on soda and other sugary drinks for more than a decade. SB 946/ Lara - Sidewalk Vendors/ Licensing: Places restrictions on a local agency regarding the regulation of sidewalk vendors from selling food or merchandise in a park owned or operated by the local authority. **Status:** **Governor's Desk.** *Creates implementation requirements; imposes on local control and authority.*

SB 1153/ Stern - Local Initiatives Public Review Process: Would authorize the proponent of a county, municipal, or district initiative to withdraw the initiative at any time before the 88th day before the election, whether or not the petition has already been found sufficient by the elections official. SB 1253 from 2014 permitted proponents of statewide initiatives to withdraw an initiative up to the qualification deadline even if it has enough valid signatures to qualify for the ballot, among other provisions. **Status:** **Signed by the Governor.** *Local tool when withdrawing initiatives.*

SB 1293/ Lara and AB 2822/ Obernolte - California State Auditor: High-Risk Local Government Agency Audit Program: Current law requires the California State Auditor to notify the Joint Legislative Audit Committee if a local government is at high risk. SB 1293 authorizes the Auditor to first conduct an initial assessment for the purpose of identifying it as a high-risk local government agency. AB 2822 authorizes the State Auditor to review publicly available information to identify local governments that are at high risk. The bills are double-joined. **Status:** **Governor's Desk.** *Will help maintain essential financial oversight.*

SB 1416/ McGuire - Nuisance Abatement: Would authorize, until January 1, 2024, a city or county to collect fines related to nuisance abatement. Would require fines/ penalties recovered to be used for local enforcement of state and local building and fire code standards. **Status:** **Governor's Desk.** *Implementation requirements; revenue from collecting fines.*

SB 1328/ Beall - Gas Tax: Study of Mileage-Based Vehicle Taxes Advances: Extends the Road Usage Charge Technical Advisory Committee for four years and requires it to continue assessing the potential for mechanisms such as a mileage-based revenue system to use as an alternative to the gas tax. **Status:** **Governor's Desk.** *Evaluating alternatives to a gas tax.*

SB 1376/ Hill - Tax on Ride-Sharing Companies: Accessibility for Persons with Disabilities: Requires the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) to develop regulations with relevant stakeholders relating to accessibility for persons with disabilities who use transportation network company (TNC) services, including wheelchair users who require a wheelchair accessible vehicle. Establishes a pilot program for taxing ride-sharing companies a minimum of 5 cents per trip that originates in a selected area, to generate revenue for programs designed to improve transportation options for persons with disabilities. **Status:** **Governor's Desk.** *Taxing ride-sharing companies for a specific purpose.*

SECTION 5: ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

AB 1445 / Reyes - Opportunity Zones: Sale or Lease of Property: Requires a city or county leasing or selling property to a qualified opportunity zone fund to collect specific information regarding timelines, employment, and the local workforce. **Status:** **Governor's Desk.** *Implementation requirements; economic development.*

AB 1918/ E. Garcia - Office of Sustainable Outdoor Recreation: Establishes the Office of Sustainable Outdoor Recreation (OREC) within the California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA). Promotes economic development and job growth of the outdoor recreation economy. California's outdoor recreation economy is the largest in the United States. **Status:** **Governor's Desk.** *Economic development.*



AB 2596/ Cooley - California Economic Development Strategic Plan: Would require the Governor's Office of Business and Economic Development to lead the preparation of a California Economic Development Strategic Plan. Local and regional economic development efforts will be included in any plan. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Economic development.*

AB 2762 / Carrillo - Public Contracts: Disabled Veteran Business Enterprises: Local Small Business Enterprises: Establishes two new preference categories for local agency procurement activities and increases the value of local preferences to help make bids that include small businesses, disabled veteran businesses, and social enterprises more competitive against other bids. Increases the maximum financial value of a single preference from \$100,000 to \$150,000. Limits the use by a local agency contracting in the following counties: Alameda, Contra Costa, Lake, Los Angeles, Marin, Napa, San Francisco, San Mateo, Santa Clara, Solano, and Sonoma. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Economic development tool. Jurisdiction-specific impact.*

AB 2853/ Medina - Warehouses: Public Input: Would require each local agency to provide specified information to the public before approving an economic development subsidy for a warehouse distribution center, as defined, and to, among things, hold hearings and report on those subsidies. See SCA 20/ Glazer. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; economic development.*

SB 1272/ Galgiani - Underground Economy: Establishes Tax Recovery and Criminal Enforcement Task Force (TRaCE) in the DOJ to combat underground economic activities through a multi-agency collaboration to, among other things, recover state revenue lost to the underground economy. An analysis reports the state's underground economy can be as large as \$140 billion annually. [Governor's Desk](#). *Revenue recovery for the State.*

SB 635 / Hueso - Local Economic Development Liaison Services: Promise Zones: Opportunity Zones: Authorizes GO-Biz to develop content and provide resources to the public about programs, including California Promise Zones (PZs) and California Opportunity Zones (OZs). Requires GO-Biz to convene representatives from various programs and agencies across the state and from various federal programs and agencies to discuss how California can leverage PZs and

OZs. There are currently a total of 22 PZs throughout the nation that were selected through three rounds of an application process, with four located in California. [Governor's Desk](#). *Economic development.*

SB 1145/ Leyva - Enhanced Infrastructure Financing Districts (EIFD) Maintenance: Authorizes EIFDs to utilize funding, excluding bond funding, to perform ongoing maintenance of capital facilities. EIFDs are an important economic development finance tool for local jurisdictions (i.e. cities, counties) to move economic development projects forward that would otherwise remain inactive or cost prohibitive, given the dissolution of redevelopment. Financing the routine maintenance or ongoing operation of the property is expressly prohibited. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; economic development.*

SB 878/ Budget Committee - Film and TV Tax Credit 3.0: SB 878 is a clean-up to SB 871 (2018) and includes a provision that changes the date by which the Legislative Analyst's Office must prepare reports related to the effectiveness and administration of the film tax credits from on or before July 1, 2019 to on or before January 1, 2023. SB 871 extends the Film Tax Credit beginning July 1, 2020 and July 1, 2025. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Economic development tool.*

SECTION 6: HOTEL TAXES/ AUDITS

SB 1194 / Lara – Consumer Privacy: Lodging, Common Carriers / Protecting Local Audits: Would prohibit entities that offer lodging, transportation, or other accommodations to the public from disclosing, producing, providing, releasing, transferring, disseminating, or otherwise communicating all or any part of any guest record, as defined, orally, in writing, or by electronic or any other means to a 3rd party, other than a California peace officer, without a court-issued subpoena, warrant, or order. MuniServices contacted the author's office with concern that an earlier version of the bill presented challenges with respect to a locals ability to perform lodging provider compliance reviews. The author agreed and accepted MuniServices suggestion to include language that protects locals' ability to use "agents" as a representative to perform TOT compliance audits. SB 1194 is doubled joined with AB 2167/ Chau. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local audits of TOT revenues; public-private partnerships.*



SECTION 7: CANNABIS

AB 2164/ Cooley - Local Ordinances: Fines and Penalties: Cannabis: Allows locals to impose penalties for violations of local ordinances associated with illegal cannabis cultivation. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; revenue from collecting fines.*

AB 2402/ Low - Personal Information: Cannabis Customers: Establishes privacy protections against the unauthorized disclosure of a cannabis consumer's personal information by a cannabis licensee. Prohibits the licensee to disclose the consumer's nonpublic personal information to a third party not directly related to the cannabis transaction. MuniServices contacted the authors office with concern that an earlier version of the bill presented challenges for a local's ability to perform compliance reviews. The author accepted MuniServices suggestions and included language that protects the ability for a local agency to use "agents" as a representative to perform cannabis compliance audits. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local audits of TOT revenues; public-private partnerships.*

AB 2020/ Quirk - Cannabis: Local Jurisdiction Licensees: Event Permits: Would authorize a state temporary event license to be issued to a licensee for an event to be held at any other venue expressly approved by a local jurisdiction for events. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Economic development; implementation requirements; local control.*

SB 930/ Hertzberg - Banks for the Cannabis Industry: Would have provided for the licensure and supervision of cannabis limited charter banks and credit unions authorized to offer limited depository services to cannabis businesses. **Status:** Held in Assembly Appropriations. *Would have created limited banking for California's cannabis industry.*

SB 1409/ Wilk - Industrial Hemp: Updates current law regarding the production and cultivation of industrial hemp in California. Industrial hemp is used for products such as paper, textiles, cosmetics and body care, food, and fabric. The California Industrial Hemp Farming Act (SB 566 of 2013) established an industrial hemp farming program for fiber and oilseed production, contingent upon federal authorization. Among various provisions the bill authorizes a local agency by way of an ordinance

to prohibit growers or seed breeders from conducting, or otherwise limiting growers' conduct of, industrial hemp cultivation, regardless of whether growers meet, or are exempt from, the registration requirements. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local authority.*

SB 1459 / Cannella - Cannabis Permitting: Creates a provisional cultivation license to address the backlog of pending license applications at both the local and state level. The current authorization will expire on January 1, 2019. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local authority.*

SECTION 8: TELECOMMUNICATIONS/ UTILITY USER TAX

AB 1959/ Wood - Telecommunications: Universal Services Programs: Would extend the sunset date for both the California High-Cost Fund-A (CHCF-A) and the California High-Cost Fund-B (CHCF-B) in order to continue to provide affordable basic telephone service to rural California. CHCF-A and the CHCF-B were established to subsidize both small independent telephone companies and large telephone corporations to provide service in the rural and smaller metropolitan communities. These subsidies are paid for by surcharges on telephone bills. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Assists rural California with telecommunications.*

AB 1999/ Chau - County Services Area (CSA): Local Government Broadband: Net Neutrality: Establishes net neutrality rules for local agencies that provide broadband services and expands the types of local agencies that may provide broadband infrastructure, services, or both. Net neutrality is the principle that Internet service providers (ISPs) should not discriminate against legal content and applications by charging content providers different delivery speeds to deliver their content. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local authority.*

AB 2339/ Gipson - Water Utility Service: Sale of Water by a City: Authorizes the Cities of El Monte, Montebello, and Willows, until January 1, 2022, to sell their water systems for the purpose of consolidating with another public water system without obtaining voter approval. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local authority for specific local agencies.*



AB 2538/ Rubio - Municipal Separate Storm Sewer Systems: Financial Capability Analysis: Would require the State Water Resources Control Board by July 1, 2019, to establish financial capability assessment guidelines for municipal separate storm sewer system permittees that are adequate and consistent when considering the costs to local jurisdictions. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local authority for specific local agencies.*

SB 901/ Dodd - Wildfires/ Impact on Utilities: Please note that MuniServices will analyze this bill for impact. As described in an analysis the bill addresses numerous issues concerning wildfire prevention, response and recovery, including funding for mutual aid, fuel reduction and forestry policies, wildfire mitigation plans by electric utilities, and cost recovery by electric corporations of wildfire-related damages. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements.*

SB 822/ Wiener - Net Neutrality/ Broadband Internet Access: Establishes net neutrality requirements by prohibiting internet service providers (ISPs) from taking certain actions that interfere with consumers' ability to lawfully access internet content, including intentionally blocking content, speeding up or slowing down traffic, engaging in paid-prioritization, requiring consideration from edge providers for access to an ISP's end users, and selectively zero-rating certain content. SB 966/ Wiener - Onsite Treated Nonpotable Water Systems: Requires, on or before December 1, 2022, the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) to adopt regulations for risk-based water quality standards for the onsite treatment and reuse of nonpotable water. The bill requires a local jurisdiction that elects to establish a program for onsite treated nonpotable water systems to, among other things, adopt, through ordinance, a local program that includes the risk-based water quality standards established by the SWRCB, to develop and propose for adoption any necessary corresponding building standards to support the risk-based water quality standards established by SWRCB. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; local authority for specific local agencies.*

SB 998/ Dodd - Discontinuation of Residential Water Service: Urban and Community Water Systems (200 or more Connections)/ Local Impact: Would prohibit an urban and community water system from discontinuing residential service for nonpayment until a payment by a customer has been delinquent for at least 60 days. Would require an urban and community water system to contact the customer named on the account and provide the customer with the urban and community water system's policy on discontinuation of residential service for nonpayment no less than 7 business days before discontinuation of residential service. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Implementation requirements; infringes on local authority and control.*

SB 1028/ Hill - PUC Customer Rates: Reductions and Adjustments: Local UUT's: Would direct the CPUC to reduce the rates it approves for investor-owned utilities for gas, electricity, and water service in order to pass on to customers the tax savings these utilities will receive under the recently enacted federal tax bill. This will indirectly result in lower UUT revenues for cities from these utilities, since UUTs are based on the customer service charges and this bill will reduce those charges. **Status:** [Governor's Desk](#). *Local UUT revenue reduction expected.*
